In 1975, it evolved as an organisation and was registered under the West Bengal Societies Act, 1961. In the 1990s, Sabuj Sangha adopted a participatory approach to empowering vulnerable communities through various social development programmes.

In 1992, the organisation was registered under The Foreign Contribution Regulations Act 1992. Over the next three decades, Sabuj Sangha expanded its operational areas to the districts of Kolkata, North 24 Parganas, Alipurduar, East Midnapore, Nadia, and Howrah districts. Sabuj Sangha works with a wide range of stakeholders including Indian and foreign funding agencies, corporate companies, trusts, institutions, and several departments of the Government of West Bengal. Sabuj Sangha has a strong network of longstanding individual supporters and well-wishers that grows year after year. The organisation is also registered under section 12A & 80G of the Income Tax Act, 1961, empanelled with NITI Ayog, Govt. India and Register with MCA, Gol CSR-1 registration no.: CSR00000299.







HEALTH & NUTRITION

The health status of Sundarbans continues to remain extremely vulnerable due to remoteness, issues of geographical accessibility, effects of climate changes, and compounding economic vulnerabilities.

The devastating COVID-19 pandemic has hit hard in India for the second time in 2021, resulting in massive losses of life and the economy. The poor medical infrastructure, geographical and physical access to healthcare facilities, insufficient outreach, folk-health traditions, religious and social customs and limited financial resources have contributed to the increased difficulties of the improved healthcare system, heavily impacting the lives of the community, especially women and children.


Sabuj Sangha aimed towards focusing on access to healthcare facilities for marginalized people; improving the health status of women and children and combating malnutrition.

COMMUNITY HEALTH PROGRAMME

Location: Mathurapur-II & Patharpratima blocks, South 24 Parganas

Supported by: Rural India Supporting Trust (RIST), Global Giving, Give India

Throughout the year, the community health programme had a huge success towards providing healthcare facilities to the underprivileged people.





Safe Motherhood

Sabuj Sangha reaches pregnant women and lactating mothers by ensuring all women receive optimal care during the period of pregnancy and post-delivery. The main objective of this programme is to identify early pregnancy to provide Ante-natal Care (ANC) as well as adequate Postnatal Care (PNC) for pregnant women.

1984 pregnant women received Ante-natal Care (ANC)

703 pregnant women availed USG facility

564 lactating mother received Post-natal Care (PNC)

85 mothers were identified to be in the High Risk category and received special institutional care

82 mothers were identified as malnourished mothers and provided with supplementary medicine from Sabuj Sangha's Rural Health Training & Center- RHTC

13000 sanitary napkins were distributed in the community at a subsidized rate to the young adolescent girls

NIRAMOY - HEALTH CARE FOR URBAN POOR

Location: Kolkata

Supported by: Wipro Cares

Rapid urbanization and mass migration in a quest for a better way of life are both contributing to the growth of slums in Kolkata and Bidhannagar metropolitan cities. The lack of essential civic amenities including drinking water, drainage, sanitation, and electricity as well as the absence of healthcare centres in urban slums has resulted in the appalling living conditions of the slum dwellers. With more than 2 decades of experience, Sabuj Sangha launched the project 'Niramoy' which aims to address the overall health issues and better healthcare services to the urban poor in the areas of ward no. 28 of Bidhannagar Municipal Corporation (BMC) and wards no. 79 and 80 of Kolkata Municipal Corporation (KMC).

MOBILE MEDICAL UNITS (MMU)

Location: Madarihat Block of Alipurduar district

Supported by: Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, GoI & GoWB

To reach out to the marginalized population and to ensure the decentralization of healthcare, Sabuj Sangha implemented Mobile Medical Units at the remotest parts of West Bengal. Through the MMUs Sabuj

Sangha continued its operation towards mitigating the gap in access to healthcare services among marginalized people. The operation was held in 6 closed tea garden areas of Madarihat Birpara block and 20 villages of Alipurduar-II & Kalchini block, reaching 23260 people through 303 clinics.

SBI-SANJEEVANI- CLINIC ON WHEELS

Location: Alipurduar –II and Kalchini Block of Alipurduar District, WB

Supported by: SBI Foundation

West Bengal faces the challenges of inadequate and inaccessible health facilities for marginalized populations. Due to a lack of access to basic health facilities, the vulnerable people here are largely dependent on local practitioners (quacks) who are not qualified. In such a context, in February 2022, Sabuj Sangha and SBI Foundation jointly made a partnership to serve the vulnerable people of the Alipurduar district. Initially, the partnership has been for 7 years. During February and March, the programme was initiated also the Mobile Medical Van and equipment were purchased to run the programme efficiently.

EDUCATION & PROTECTION

KISHALAYA SISHU SHIKSHA NIKETAN (KSSN)

Location: Nandakumarpur, South 24 Parganas
Supported by: Asha For Education, Global Giving, Give India, Tech Mahindra

This Model School runs classes from Nursery to 8th standard for children of disadvantaged families in the remote Nandakumarpur region and surrounding areas. People from this area are barely aware of the importance of education. Therefore, education has been a far-fetched dream for the children of this area. Thus, Kishalaya Sishu Shiksha Niketan has opened up with the motive of Integrated Education to the children which not only caters to Formal Education but also builds their technical and livelihood skills. Affiliated to the Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal, the school follows the syllabus of Boards of West Bengal Primary & Upper Primary Education. The lockdown period has shown a

Subhajit Dhar's father, Khokan Dhar shared his experience:

"We have gone through a tough situation due to the COVID-19 lockdown period. During this time, all the school remained closed according to Government guidelines and Kishalaya Sishu Shiksha Niketan (KSSN) was not an exception. We were very much worried about our children as it was hampering their studies. Though KSSN was closed, the school set up a new dimension in the remote corner of Sundarbans. The teachers started to take online classes. This was mesmerizing in the sequestered locality. My son Subhajit started to do online classes. I also learned the process of this online system from him as this was completely unknown to me. Besides, the school has celebrated various observation days, such as Independence Day, Teachers' Day, etc. via the online platform. This is appreciable."

NATUN ALO

Location: Mathurapur-II, South 24 Parganas
Supported by: Asha For Education

Compelled with abject poverty, children in rural areas become a victim of child labour at young ages. The 'Natun Alo' programme has brought a new ray of hope to the underprivileged children of Sundarbans. Sabuj Sangha runs this residential school for those boys who are deprived of basic needs. Housing 35 boys, this residential school provides educational, recreational, healthcare and nutritional support to the children so that they can have a bright childhood and future. Day by day, these boys show great improvement in engaging in school activities and adapting to discipline and routine. Along with educational

Story of Ashadul

16 years old Ashadul now dreams of a brighter future. Yet he started his life with a barrage of challenges that deprived him of even the primary needs of maternal care and affection. In extreme poverty both his parents forced him to earn money with hard labour at a very tender age of around 10 years. They were both Brick Kiln workers and thus got Ashadul involved there. Without having any option for an education, in a very malnourished health Ashadul started carrying bricks.

Gradually extreme hard labour and pollution of the brick kiln area impacted Ashadul's health severely. That aggravated with extreme malnourishment. He became a patient of hyperglycemia with a blurred vision of eyes. One day he ran off and reached his home. But again he had to start stitching bags for a living – not only for himself but also for a younger sister.

Fortunately, after such struggles, he got admitted to our residential school – Natun Alo. Ashadul's biological mother, who introduced herself to him and the world as her maternal aunt - 'masi' to get rid of his responsibilities and also by mobilization of some aware persons got him admitted.

Ashadul now studies in class VI. He has now turned out to be a friendly boy among others. Improving fast he now loves Mathematics. In his free time, he loves to solve math problems. "I don't know what I would have done if I hadn't come here", says Ashadul earnestly with a sigh of relief.

Ashadul's story embodies the struggles, sacrifices and odds that a little child in rural Bengal overcomes to continue his education.

NAYANTARA

Location: South 24 Parganas, West Bengal
Supported by: Asha For Education, The Ramkrishna Foundation

In the poverty-stricken areas of Sundarbans, women and girls remain confined to household core activities without having the liberty to live an independent and self-reliant life. With an approach to prevent the early marriage of the girls from the area; to ensure the girl children's education of the community; to promote the health status of the adolescent girls in the locality; to accelerate the development process of the society by empowering adolescent girls through development of their leadership qualities, Sabuj Sangha implemented the Nayantara programme in 3 remote Sundarbans villages.

Our Nayantara girls have mobilized funds with their initiative and distributed dress materials, books and educational materials to the poor



girls using their own funds and also they have also distributed relief materials during the Yaas cyclone.

NABADIGANTA

Location: Kumargram block in Alipurduar District
Supported by: Asha For Education

The Nabadiganta programme aims to provide educational support, including basic healthcare facilities, nutritional support to the tribal children of Uttar Nararthali and Turturikhand tea garden in Kumargram block, Alipurduar District. The Kumargram block shares the international border of Bhutan and Bangladesh at the northern and eastern side. Children from this area are mostly first generation learners therefore a great emphasis is on activity based learning and co-curricular engagements to involve them in education in innovative ways.

REHABILITATION OF DEPRIVED CHILDREN THROUGH EDUCATION (RDCE)

Location: Slums and squatter colonies of Sealdah South Section of Eastern Railway, South 24 Parganas

Supported by: IKP Foundation, Give India

'Sabuj Sangha' is running an education support coaching centre for the Rehabilitation of Deprived Children through Education (RDCE) namely 'Sabuj Kunri', Taldi at Taldi Station Area en route Sealdah South Division in South 24 Parganas district, West Bengal India. This initiative is aimed to provide support to deprived children from the railways squatter colonies who are First Generation Learners or Dropped Out due to circumstantial pressure or else for mainstreaming and continuing their formal education. Emphasis is given to activity



based learning and co-curricular engagements to involve them in education in innovative ways.

Location: Champahati, South 24 Parganas

To ensure the basic child rights of care, education and chance for preparation of building future Sabuj Sangha is running a Child Support Centre cum School name 'Aalor Disha' at the peri-urban area of Kolkata city in



Champahati, South 24 Parganas, West Bengal, India.

The child support centre is aimed to mainstream the deprived children from marginalised families in squatter colonies of railway tracks of Champahati and Kalikapur region at Sealdah South Division in South 24 Parganas district, West Bengal India.

The initiative is aimed at educational support, nutrition support and personality grooming with proper training and finally to prepare them for future struggles to break through the vicious cycle of intergenerational poverty.

CHILDLINE

Location: Baruipur and Canning-I of South 24 Parganas District, West Bengal

Supported by: Childline India Foundation

To ensure that every child has access to emergency assistance, CHILDLINE (1098) continued its operation during the outbreak of the COVID-19 Pandemic. In 2021-22, CHILDLINE 1098 services were operational round-the-clock to ensure that every child in distress received care and protection. During this period the CHILDLINE team members participated in various activities such as intervention, outreach programme, community awareness etc.

SAVE VILLAGE PROGRAMME

Location: South 24 Parganas and Alipurduar district of West Bengal

Supported by: My Choices Foundation

In 2021-22 Sabuj Sangha continued its operation in several villages of South 24 Parganas and Alipurduar district of West Bengal. This programmes aims to give women, children and families in India choices to live their lives free from violence, abuse and exploitation. During this period this programme facilitates various school awareness programmes, meeting with community children, stakeholders meetings etc.

LIVELIHOOD & WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

DIGITAL SAKHI

Location: East Midnapore District of West Bengal

Supported by: L&T Financial Services Pvt. Ltd.

'Digital Sakhi' is a rural woman, with a device in hand, equipped with skills and knowledge to confidently impart digital financial literacy to women in the identified villages. A total of 450

Digital Sakhis were oriented by Sabuj Sangha to start their work and continue their work of economic empowerment.

This programme enables **450 Digital Sakhis** across 133 villages and 12 blocks in East Midnapore who in turn will impart training to community people in rural areas to conduct daily transactions using digital modes of payments. During the COVID-19 pandemic several women started doing different trades, such as animal husbandry, Agriculture, Fishery etc. Our Digital Sakhis identified 1000 woman entrepreneurs from 35 villages through baseline surveys and mobilized them with trade-based training to groom themselves as successful women entrepreneurs.

1,57,121 community people are linked in various Government entitlements and schemes through Digital Sakhis during COVID-19 pandemic

1000 women entrepreneurs from 35 villages got trade based training to groom themselves as successful women entrepreneurs out of which 270 women entrepreneurs got Agriculture training, 390 women entrepreneurs got training on Animal Husbandry, 210 women entrepreneurs got capacity building training on small business and 130 women entrepreneurs capacitated with Fishery training.

80 digital Seva Kendra were developed within 133 villages of East Midnapore

10 Solar Lights installed to illuminate remote locations in 10 different villages

03 Village Health Camps organized in 3 different villages enhancing awareness on health issues and accessibility to close govt. health facilities;

01 Animal Health Camp organized catering animal health treatment services

30 Beekeeping Boxes for Honey cultivation were supported along with trainings and necessary support to 2 women Self Help Groups (SHGs) in 2 different villages

03 Beneficiaries were supported in Pond Based Integrated Farming (PBIF)

01 awareness session organized on Menstruation health & Hygiene through Behaviour Change Communication covering 70 young women & adolescent girls

SUNDARBAN GERMAN BAKERY

Location: South 24 Parganas District of West Bengal

Supported by: Hanseatic India Forum, Germany and IndienHilfe, Germany

In the year 2021 Sundarban German Bakery has completed its 6th year of operations. Our Bakery unit is managed by the women's SHG federation- 'Sundarban Mohila Swanirvar Gosthi Cooperative Ltd.' that affords nutritious fresh bakery products to the local people of remote Sundarbans. Every day the bakery produces various types of cakes, biscuits and breads using high quality food ingredients. All the production and packaging staff maintain



proper hygiene during every step of production and packaging. The suppliers are serving quality and fresh food items to the shopkeepers/buyers every day.

210 kgs of flour are used daily in the bakery unit.

25 Types of biscuits, cakes and breads are produced every day

10 People runs the bakery daily

ASTHA - A LIVELIHOOD RESTORATION SUPPORT PROGRAMME

Location: South 24 Parganas, West Bengal
Supported by: Give India

The double impact of the long continued Covid-19 Pandemic and the sudden Amphan Cyclone in 2020 devastated the lives and livelihoods of marginalised people in Sagar Island of South 24 Parganas, West Bengal India leaving them at the edge of sustenance. In such a context 'Sabuj Sangha' with support from some kind-hearted Philanthropist Individuals and Charities through 'Give Foundation' extended support to such most financially impacted vulnerable families here in restoring their livelihood through Poultry Farming and Pond Based Integrated Farming (PBIF) under the programme – 'Astha - A Livelihood Restoration Support Programme' to Covid-19 Affected Families in South 24 Parganas district, West Bengal.

150 Marginalized Families are supported for Poultry Farming

100 Marginalized Families are supported for Pond Based Integrated Farming

GOATARY

Location: South 24 Parganas, West Bengal
Supported by: IndienHilfe e.V., Germany

Under this project, the Black Bengal species of goat are distributed among the identified marginalised beneficiaries at villages of Sagar, South 24 Parganas. Milk production is comparatively low yet the skin and meat of this variety is quite popular and are sold at high price. Beneficiaries are identified from Sumatinagar village of Dhaspara-Sumatinagar II Gram Panchayat under Sagar block of South 24 Parganas. The beneficiaries belong to much marginalised poverty stricken families. The identified families were capacitated with a scientific goat rearing process including feeding and accommodation arrangements. With this Project the beneficiary families become able to increase their income level and improve the standard of living.

POND BASED INTEGRATED FARMING

Location: Sagar, South 24 Parganas
Supported by: IndienHilfe e.V. Germany

To promote the highest and optimal utilisation of available natural resources for supporting livelihood among the marginalized communities of remote Sunderbans, Sabuj Sangha endeavoured Pond Based Integrated Farming (PBIF) system since last more than a decade. In this order, the organization expanded operations in remote Sagar Island too. Through PBIF efforts marginalised farmers of various regions initiated cultivation at the embankments of the pond they are using for fish cultivation. They are also utilising the areas of Pond Embankments for the construction of Poultry Farm etc. Thus the returns have manifold nearly twice what they expected.

50 Marginalized Families are supported

The Remote Astichak Village now rising to see their dawn...

Astichak is a small village under Bathuari Gram Panchayat in Egra II block and around 30 km from the District Resource Center of Sabuj Sangha at Contai, East Midnapore district, West Bengal. It had been a place of serene, stoic, and monotonous life.

Ms. Anima Giri and Ms. TanimaGiri, the village digital sakhis, were able to transform the village into a place of business exchanges and gradually grew a busy life through their diligence and consistent mobilization. They remained successful in spreading knowledge regarding digital modes of payment and promoting financial inclusion among rural women.

More than 1800 families in this village are now transacting digitally through various platforms, such as USSD (Unstructured Supplementary Service Data), AEPS (Aadhar Enabled Payment Service), Google Pay, Phone Pay etc. Nowadays, digital payments have become a convenient way to make transactions even for those who don't own a smart phone. Furthermore, over 50% of shopkeepers now use QR codes and online transactions in their daily business operations.

Out of the total population, i.e. 3447, our targeted beneficiaries are 2455, where 2310 beneficiaries have bank accounts and out of them, 1087 beneficiaries' bank accounts have been opened by the Digital Sakhis to date. People here now have started opening bank accounts and are increasingly using bank debit cards. In total, one SBI-ATM has been installed in the village to assist community members with cash withdrawals. They do not have to go to another village for the withdrawal of money.

Also, with the orientation of digital and financial literacy and training on various rural trades, the women here who used to be shy, timid housewives always confined within the family sentinel are now sharing hands in increasing family earnings, leading the varied range of small businesses, e.g. Dairy Farming, Agriculture, Poultry Farming, Grocery Shops etc.

The Digital Sakhis also facilitates the villagers' getting linked with the various government social security schemes. Thus, a large number of financially disadvantaged families, are now aware of their entitlement rights and gradually coming under the various social security schemes, e.g., Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojana (PMSBY), Atal Pension Yojana (APY), Swasthya Sathi, Kanyashree, Ruposree, etc.

In the village, the two digital Sakhis have now become role models for a large population, specifically women and youths. The entire village of Astichak is now rising to see their dawn and proceed forward.





WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE



INSTALLATION OF DRINKING WATER SOURCES

Location: South 24 Parganas District, West Bengal

Supported by: Wipro Foundation, HDFC Bank Ltd., Ramkrishna Foundation

In Rural India the state of Safe Water Resources, Sanitation and Hygiene is extremely poor. For the last two decades, Sabuj Sangha has remained consistent to improve the lives of these local people residing in remote corners of Sundarbans. To ensure safe Drinking Water this year we have installed Hand pumps with raised Platforms at vulnerable Cyclone-Impacted locations of Sagar Island. This year we have created Water User Committees at the community level and capacited them with proper knowledge regarding the maintenance of the infrastructural facilities.

The school WATSAN Committees (Decisive committee for look after and decisions for any Water & Sanitation related matters) are actively maintaining the installed infrastructure.

03 tube wells with high raised platforms and soak pits were installed in 3 distinct villages

450 people reached through the safe drinking water

AWARENESS & KNOWLEDGE SHARING ON PERSONAL HYGIENE

Location: South 24 Parganas, Alipurduar, Kolkata Municipal Corporation (KMC), Bidhannagar Municipal Corporation (BMC), West Bengal

Supported by: Wipro Foundation, Rural India Supporting Trust (RIST), The Ramkrishna Foundation, HDFC Bank Ltd.



Poor hygiene practices and inadequate sanitary conditions play major roles in the increased burden of communicable diseases. As a result, the worst affected are the children, adolescents and women who need urgent help.

Sabuj Sangha has continued Awareness and Sessions on Personal & Menstrual Hygiene in various locations of South 24 Parganas and Kolkata and Bidhannagar regions of West Bengal. For the last few years, Sabuj Sangha has been operational in upgrading the lives of community people especially women and adolescent girls in both urban and rural areas.

Several discussions on basic hygiene, maintenance of cleanliness, discussion on communicable diseases, maintenance of lifestyle, food habits and so on are important topics of discussion during the regular awareness campaigns. Community people are encouraged to keep the environment clean and ensure proper disposal of waste materials to avoid the spread of germs and infections.

The essentiality of using Sanitary Napkins in place of any available unsanitized clothes is explained and discussed thoroughly in small

focused groups with women and adolescent girls in communities and schools. In this regard Behaviour Change Communication (BCC) mode our Doctors and Other Medical Staff interacted with all participants and explained various issues of Menstrual Health & Hygiene. In this regard to bring about the behavioural change, we provide Sanitary Napkins.

ENVIRONMENT & DISASTER RESPONSE

RESPONDING TO COVID-19: INCREASING RESILIENCE OF VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES IN SUNDARBANS DELTA, WEST BENGAL, INDIA

Location: South 24 Parganas District of West Bengal

Supported by: Save the Children, Switzerland, Health & family Welfare, GoWB

The second wave of COVID-19 has affected the population in the Sundarbans delta, West Bengal, which even in normal circumstances has poor access to health services due to its remoteness and poor land connectivity. The population is exposed to disaster risks, like cyclones or floods, almost every year. Many working in urban areas returned home due to lockdown restrictions, with a high possibility of introducing the virus to the local community. The overall vaccination percentage in India remained low. The second wave of COVID-19

hit hard in March 2021, a year after the lockdown was implemented. The lockdown left tens of millions of migrant workers unemployed and due to this unemployment, the migrant workers were left with no livelihood.

During May 2021, the second wave subsided, but hospitalizations and deaths remained high. The daily cases escalated dramatically due to a lack of awareness among people. The West Bengal State Government had committed itself to increase COVID-19 hospital bed capacities, but these were not within reach of the affected population of this designated intervention. The closest hospital with the necessary equipment is 60km away. Moreover, the knowledge of COVID-19 best practices, general lax attitude towards lockdown measures, as well as access to vaccination and testing was also limited within rural communities, where the consequences of infection may be much more severe.

46323 people got the 1st dose of vaccination and

41708 people got 2nd dose of vaccination

27356 people were mobilized on the Government COVID vaccination programme

2349 people availed Out-Patient Department (OPD) during the pandemic, out of which 47 patients were found positive after Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) and 816 were negative

14 primary health care centres were supported by Sabuj Sangha during the pandemic with safety and hygiene kits

To help the poor vulnerable communities of Sundarbans Delta, India with necessary health care facilities and community sensitization, on the March 24th – 26th, 2022 Sabuj Sangha in collaboration with Save the Children India, organized a 3 days' workshop. The workshop was mainly aimed to address the key achievements and learning from the second wave of COVID-19 and also to gaining insights through knowledge exchange with fellow participants and stakeholders. Dignitaries and distinguished eminent personalities from different walks of life and representatives of communities from different gram Panchayats of Sagar, Patharpratima and Mathurapur II blocks were present at the workshop.

COVID RELIEF

Location: Kolkata, South 24 Parganas of West Bengal

Supported by: Azim Premji Foundation, ASHA For Education

During COVID-19 pandemic Sabuj Sangha distributed relief materials included dry ration to the most affected people of Sundarbans and also provided medical equipment including oximeters, digital thermometers, and thermal guns to the hospital - 'Swarnalata Sabuj Seva Sadan'.

1000 families got medical attention through our hospital - 'Swarnalata Sabuj Seva Sadan'

400 families were impacted through the distribution of dry ration

YAAS RELIEF

Location: South 24 Parganas, East Midnapore of West Bengal

Supported by: HCL Foundation, L&T Financial Services Pvt. Ltd.

The Yaas cyclone made its landfall in May 2021. However, much before landfall, the cyclone brought about strong winds and heavy rainfall, causing and havoc damage to the lives and livelihoods of the inhabitants of South 24 Parganas and East Midnapore West Bengal, India. With both the pre-onset and onset of the cyclone, some areas were left devastated. Coastal areas like Sundarbans in North and South 24 Parganas, Digha and Mandarmani in Midnapore and several other areas were much affected as inflated rivers inundated the riverbanks and broke away dams and barriers. Many parts in both the South 24 Parganas and East Midnapore districts are still under brackish and salty water, which polluted the sweet water ponds, resulting in a significant loss of fish cultivation. This is exacerbated by erosion and outflow in various river embankments. The marginalized communities more specifically the Coastal and Riverine area people, were deeply impacted by huge damages made to their houses, materials which are the source of livelihoods (e.g.

Cultivated Crops, Boats, Fish Nets etc.) and the essential requirements of life (e.g. Cloths, Foods, Daily Utilities etc.) that is needed highly to maintain a normal dignified life.

'Sabuj Sangha' as a prominent grass-root Civil Society Organization of West Bengal has been deeply involved with consistent efforts towards response to Natural Catastrophes. Thus prompt action reached out to the people of the most impacted areas of coastal and riverside districts –South 24 Parganas and East Midnapore. At that very moment, we responded with immediate needs of cooked foods, Drinking water, Medical Aid etc.

Sundari- A Resilience Programme is endeavoured to undertake the rejuvenation & conservation of mangrove vegetation in Sundarbans and create Mangrove Sensitive Communities & Mangrove Protection Groups with an option to establish Natural Resource Based Alternative Livelihood for the members of the Groups.

- **A Model Nursery cum garden** is established for Production of Mangrove Saplings
- **One (1) Mangrove Protection Group (MPG)** formed consist of **50** members ensuring Mangrove Sensitive Community among **500** marginalised families
- **Production, Seed Germination and Plantation** at River Beds and country sides by local marginalised women
- **MPG members** carrying their livelihoods with Goatery, Pond Based Integrated Farming and Poultry
- A Community Based DRR and Livelihood School is in progress.
