Sabuj Sangha began as a social club in 1954 in Nandakumarpur, a village in the South 24 Parganas district of West Bengal. By 1975, it had officially transformed into an organized entity and was registered under the West Bengal Societies Act of 1961. In the 1990s, the organization adopted a more participatory strategy to empower marginalized communities through a range of social development initiatives.

In 1992, Sabuj Sangha was also registered under the Foreign Contribution Regulations Act of 1976. Over the next thirty years, it significantly broadened its scope, extending its operations to districts such as Kolkata, North 24 Parganas, Alipurduar, East Midnapore, Nadia, Darjeeling, and Howrah. The organization collaborates with a diverse array of stakeholders, including both domestic and international funding agencies, corporate partners, trusts, institutions, and various departments of the West Bengal government. Additionally, Sabuj Sangha benefits from a robust and growing network of individual supporters and well-wishers. The organization is registered under Section 12A & 80G of the Income Tax Act, 1961, empanelled with NITI Ayog, Govt. India and registered with MCA, GoI CSR-I registration no.: CSR00000299.

MEMBER, COMPLETED 10TH STANDARD



Building on our institutional experience, it addresses multiple issues and needs across the thematic areas of health and nutrition; water, hygiene, and sanitation; education, livelihoods, women's empowerment, and environmental risk reduction.

Our programs aim to deliver vital healthcare services, educate on health and hygiene, and ensure that all individuals—particularly women, children, and the elderly—receive the essential nutrition needed for their well-being. Through community-driven initiatives, health camps, and collaborations with local health authorities, we strive to promote sustainable health practices and support the overall development of the communities we serve in the districts of South 24 Parganas, North 24 Parganas, Kolkata, Nadia, Darjeeling, and Alipurduar.


Community Health Programme

Location: South 24 Parganas, West Bengal

Supported by: Individual Donations, Give Foundation

In the year 2023-24, the community health programme covered a total 15669 population within the marginalized communities of Sundarbans region, South 24 Parganas, West Bengal. The safe motherhood is dedicated to ensuring comprehensive care for women throughout their pregnancy and postnatal period. This initiative focuses on facilitating access to essential services, from prenatal care to post-delivery support, while also emphasizing the importance of early risk identification and management.

Project Niramoy

Location: 8 Wards of Kolkata, Bidhannagar Municipal Corporations and Rajpur Sonarpur Municipality, North 24 Parganas, West Bengal

Supported by: Wipro Cares, Wipro Foundation

Rapid urbanization in Kolkata has made urban slums more susceptible to poor hygiene, waterborne diseases, and inadequate access to safe drinking water, increasing residents' exposure to communicable and non-communicable diseases. To address these challenges, Sabuj Sangha, in collaboration with Wipro Cares and Wipro Foundation, launched the 'Niramoy' project in 2019 to provide enhanced healthcare services to the urban poor. The project operates in wards no. 28, 35, 36 of Bidhannagar Municipal Corporation; wards no. 58, 79, 80, 108 of Kolkata Municipal Corporation; and ward no. 10 of Rajpur Sonarpur Municipality.

Gram Seva

The Gram Seva Program is a crucial healthcare initiative by Sabuj Sangha, supported by the SBI Foundation, aimed at providing medical services to marginalised rural communities. The Mobile Medical Unit (MMU) reaches remote villages with limited

healthcare infrastructure, offering health check-ups, treatment for common ailments, and awareness sessions. The programme focuses on maternal and child health, prevention of diseases, and promotion of healthy practices, ensuring that vulnerable populations receive essential care.

Sanjeevani

Location: Alipurduar district, West Bengal

The Sanjeevani Program is a mobile medical clinic initiative operating in the Alipurduar district, aimed at serving marginalized communities with limited access to healthcare. Implemented by Sabuj Sangha in partnership with the SBI Foundation, this program delivers essential medical services directly to those in need, addressing the geographical and economic barriers that often hinder access to care. The mobile clinic offers regular health check-ups, treatment for common illnesses, maternal and child health services, and health education sessions. By providing these vital services, the Sanjeevani Program significantly contributes to improving health outcomes and enhancing the well-being of vulnerable populations in the region.

Eye Care Project

Location: South 24 Parganas, West Bengal

Supported by: SBI Foundation

Due to the lack of access to basic healthcare services, the most marginalised population in the Sundarbans suffer from preventable eye conditions that can lead to blindness or severe vision impairment if left untreated. To address this urgent need, the Eye Care Programme was launched in partnership with the SBI Foundation to provide comprehensive and accessible eye care to these underserved communities. Through this programme, regular eye camps, eye examinations, treatment for common eye conditions, and necessary corrective interventions, such as spectacles and surgeries, are done at minimal costs. This initiative has been crucial in enhancing the quality of life for many, ensuring essential vision care reaches those most in need.

Mobile Medical Unit

Location: Alipurduar District & Siliguri Mahakuma Parishad of Darjeeling District, West Bengal Supported by: National Health Mission, Department of Health & Family welfare Gol & GoWB

Sabuj Sangha implemented Mobile Medical Units in the remotest parts of the north of West Bengal to ensure marginalised people's access to basic healthcare facilities and services and decentralisation of healthcare. The program has brought quality healthcare directly to people's doorsteps, offering services from professional doctors, laboratory tests, free medicines, X-rays, and ECGs, which has minimized travel time and reduced transportation issues. It has enhanced health-seeking behaviour, enabled early detection and treatment of diseases, and increased awareness, leading to better disease prevention. It has reduced out-of-pocket expenses and dependency on unqualified health providers. However, a significant challenge remains as many residents from closed or struggling tea estates and forest areas lack the financial means to purchase medicines independently

Insufficient educational attainment and awareness contribute to various societal issues, including human trafficking, child labour, school dropouts, and hazardous working conditions. Particularly women and girls, face challenges such as early marriage and motherhood, which impede their personal and professional development. In response to these challenges, Sabuj Sangha is committed to working with children from marginalised communities to uphold their right to education and advocate for their protection. Through its Education & Protection program, Sabuj Sangha strives to empower these communities by providing access to quality education and ensuring the well-being and safety of every child.

Kishalaya Sishu Siksha Niketan, a vital initiative under Sabuj Sangha's educational programs, is committed to providing quality education to children from marginalized communities in the Sundarbans region. This institution not only focuses on academic excellence but also emphasizes the holistic development of its students. With a child-centric approach, Kishalaya Sishu Siksha Niketan offers a nurturing environment where children can learn and grow. The school is equipped with dedicated teachers who employ innovative teaching methods to make learning engaging and impactful. In addition to academic learning, the school promotes extracurricular activities, life skills education, and health and hygiene awareness, ensuring the overall well-being of its students. Through this initiative, Sabuj Sangha aims to break the cycle of poverty and illiteracy by empowering children with the knowledge and skills necessary for a brighter future.

208 boys and girls are currently enrolled in this school



Nabadiganta

Location: Alipurduar District, West Bengal

This programme ensures that children from marginalised communities receive essential educational resources and opportunities for quality learning. In addition to educational support, Nabadiganta addresses critical health and nutritional needs by offering basic healthcare services and nutritional aid, essential for the children's overall development. By combining education with health and nutrition, the program seeks to create a holistically nurturing environment for children.

Nayantara - Empowering girl children through Education & Entrepreneurship Development

Location: South 24 Parganas District, West Bengal

Supported by: IndienHilfe e. V (Germany), Kanailal Raha Foundation (USA), Asha for Education, Ramakrishna Foundation (USA)

Sabuj Sangha's flagship initiative, Nayantara, is making significant progress in addressing deep-rooted gender discrimination and challenges faced by girls in the remote villages of Sundarbans, including Mathurapur II, Patharpratima, and Sagar blocks in South 24 Parganas district. The program tackles critical issues such as the neglect of the girl child, early marriage, early motherhood, and high maternal and infant mortality rates. In addition to these crucial interventions, Nayantara enhances the physical and mental well-being of the girls by incorporating football into the curriculum. This approach fosters a supportive environment where girls can overcome gender barriers, acquire essential life skills, improve their physical and mental health, and become proactive agents of change, thereby contributing to sustainable development in the Sundarbans.

218 girls are enrolled in this programme

- girls have successfully passed the Secondary Examination (10th standard) and are admitted to Higher Secondary courses
- 6 girls have successfully passed the Higher Secondary Examination (12th standard)
- 5 child marriages were prevented by the Nayantara girls in their community.



The achievements of these girls are particularly commendable since they are first-generation learners and fight against the odds of gender discrimination and stereotyping in their everyday lives to remain in the education system and become independent. Being part of the Nayantara programme has contributed significantly to building their leadership and confidence to challenge social norms and overcome the barriers imposed on women in society.

Child Marriage Successfully Prevented: A Collaborative Effort by Nayantara Team and Local Authorities

On the morning of September 10, 2024, a Nayantara Kishori (a girl who was part of the programme) received an urgent tip from a friend about a planned child marriage set to occur that evening. Acting swiftly, the Kishori informed a Nayantara Supervisor, who immediately mobilized the team to verify the details. By around 4 pm that day, it was confirmed that the marriage was scheduled for the auspicious sunset hour, known as "godhuli lagna". The team consulted internally and deliberated on their options: visiting the site, informing the local government, or contacting ChildLine. Based on past experiences, they decided on a direct intervention.

The Nayantara team, consisting of three staff members, four Nayantara Mitras, and eight Nayantara Kishoris, quickly made their way to the boy's house where the marriage was to take place. As they approached, a man fishing nearby rushed to alert the household. Despite knowing that the family will try to hide the truth, the team pressed on, determined to prevent the illegal marriage.

Upon arrival, the family claimed that the boy had brought a girl home the previous night but had sent her back by morning. When questioned about the boy's whereabouts, the mother said he was in Raidighi (another location in the vicinity), while the father stated he was with friends, offering conflicting and evasive responses. The family's inconsistent answers and refusal to provide a contact number for the boy only heightened the team's suspicions. Despite the family's reluctance, the team continued to counsel them against proceeding with the child marriage.

Concerned that the girl might still be hidden nearby, the team called a local Panchayat member to further investigate. A thorough search of the premises did not reveal the girl's whereabouts. The Panchayat representative also counseled the family, suspecting that the girl was still in their custody.

The situation escalated when the boy's father brought in a woman community member to confront the Nayantara team, attempting to intimidate and dissuade them from further action. Despite the tension, the team informed ChildLine and a local police team was dispatched immediately. Prioritizing the safety of the Nayantara Kishoris and staff, the team briefly withdrew until police arrived.

Returning with the police, the team witnessed continued defiance from the family, who provided contradictory information and falsely claimed that the boy was missing. The police detained the boy's mother and sisters, investigating their involvement in hiding the girl and filing a missing person's report for the boy.

The next day, upon following up with ChildLine, the Nayantara team learned that the girl had been safely rescued and placed in a protective home, though the boy remained missing. Despite these challenges, the team felt a profound sense of achievement, knowing they had successfully intervened to prevent a child marriage and protect the rights of the young girl involved. This case stands as a testament to the power of swift, coordinated community action in safeguarding vulnerable children.

The challenging financial conditions in the remote regions of Sundarbans frequently result in children becoming victims of trafficking and child labour. The Natun Aalo program addresses this issue by operating a residential school specifically for boys from marginalized families who have been affected by child labour and trafficking. Currently, the school houses 26 boys, offering them educational, recreational, healthcare, and nutritional support to ensure a positive childhood and future. The children have shown notable progress in their participation in school activities and in maintaining discipline and routine.

Aalor Disha School

Location: South 24 Parganas district, West Bengal

Supported by: IndienHilfe e. V. Germany

Since 2021, Sabuj Sangha has been operating a Child Support Centre called 'Aalor Disha' in Champahati, a peri-urban area of Kolkata, located in the Baruipur Block of South 24 Parganas district, West Bengal, India. The centre provides educational and personality development support to children from marginalized families living in slums along the railway tracks of the Sealdah division of Eastern Railways. Many of these children lack the essential care and affection needed for a responsible upbringing and often face dire financial conditions. Consequently, they may drop out of school, fall into addiction, or become involved in hazardous labour such as portering or rag picking. Additionally, there is a significant risk of these children being trafficked under the guise of job opportunities.

Currently, Aalor Disha supports 50 children—31 girls and 19 boys—from various localities, including Champahati, South Garia, Kalikapur 2, Kurali, and Chandaneswar. These children receive ongoing support, and mentorship, and are enrolled in formal schools, where they pursue their education with the hope of a better future.

The children presented PowerPoint projects on current issues and received performance-based recognition and certificates for completing the program.

As part of the Holistic Rural Development Project, substantial progress has been made in upgrading the educational infrastructure of five government schools in the Sundarbans region. The integration of technology into the education system has effectively bridged the gap between rural and urban education, enabling students in these remote areas to access high-quality learning opportunities. This infrastructure development is a pivotal step towards empowering the next generation with the skills and knowledge needed to succeed in a rapidly changing world, fostering an environment that supports both academic and personal growth.

In marginalised communities, where economic opportunities are limited, women's participation helps break the cycle of poverty and social exclusion. It challenges traditional gender roles, promotes gender equality, and enhances women's social status. Additionally, including women in the workforce taps into a vast, underutilized talent pool, driving productivity and innovation. Through all its livelihoods initiatives, Sabuj Sangha promotes financial independence and empowers women to make decisions that improve their families' well-being, such as investing in education, healthcare, and nutrition. When women earn, entire communities benefit, leading to a ripple effect of economic growth and poverty reduction. Moreover, women's economic empowerment is essential for sustainable development, as it contributes to closing the gender gap and achieving broader societal progress.

Digital Sakhi

Location: East Medinipur & Murshidabad Districts of West Bengal

Supported by: L&T Finance

Digital Sakhi is a transformative project that has empowered women and promoted digital financial literacy in West Bengal. In 2023, the project extended its journey to Murshidabad as well, including a substantial number of rural women who were trained as women entrepreneurs. This past year, a cadre was created of 100 well-trained Digital Sakhis driving Digital Financial literacy & inclusion within 181 villages across 23 Gram Panchayats in Murshidabad District, West Bengal. Additionally, the project has assisted a significant number of individuals in availing government social security schemes. Beyond financial inclusion, Digital Sakhi has also contributed to community development through various initiatives. These combined efforts have empowered women, enhanced financial literacy, and improved the overall well-being of rural communities in West Bengal.

From Flames to Relief: Digital Sakhis Unite in the Face of Tragedy

On April 17, 2024, a catastrophic fire ignited in Chaighari Gram Panchayat due to a faulty electric wire, engulfing two homes in flames. Payel Mondal, a dedicated Digital Sakhi serving in the same area, was working on the opposite side of the village that day. When a fellow Digital Sakhi, Sarifa, alerted her about the incident, she was initially unable to pinpoint the exact location. Seeking clarity, Payel reached out to her husband, who provided a live broadcast of the unfolding disaster. The footage enabled her to identify the affected area promptly.

Upon arriving, Payel found the houses and shops in ruins, with livestock casualties scattered in the debris. The community was in profound distress. She recognized an elderly woman she had previously met during a visit to explain government schemes and digital financial inclusion. The woman, now visibly anguished with burnt clothes and a damaged shop, clutched Payel's hand, revealing severe burns.

Moved by the woman's plight, Payel quickly mobilized her fellow Digital Sakhis. Despite their limited financial resources, they coordinated to provide essential supplies, including clothing, food through digital payments, and medicine for the injured. The community expressed heartfelt gratitude and blessings for their support.

Additionally, it was revealed that one of the households had lost six months' worth of earnings and loan money in the fire, highlighting the risks of keeping cash at home. In response, Payel and her team's efforts not only provided immediate relief but also highlighted the importance of digital financial services in safeguarding against such crises. Their actions underscore the transformative impact of community-driven digital initiatives in fostering resilience and **28** empowerment during challenging times.

Holistic Rural Development Programme (HRDP)

Location: Sagar Block, South 24 Parganas District, West Bengal

Supported by: HDFC Bank Ltd.

Started in 2021, the Holistic Rural Development Programme aims to empower rural communities, particularly women, by enhancing livelihood opportunities through entrepreneurship, digital literacy, and skill building. A key focus is on raising awareness of entitlements and government schemes, enabling communities to access essential resources. The programme seeks to ensure food and social security for the poorest families and fosters the creation of community institutions that support entrepreneurship. These institutions equip individuals with marketing and business skills, promoting sustainable growth of agro-based and livestock products to reach wider markets.

This past year, a significant milestone has been the establishment of a Farmers Producers Company (FPC) namely **Gangasagar Mahamuni Kapil Farmers Producers Company Ltd.** with 350 shareholders.

Journey from Homemaker to Entrepreneur: A Story of Transformation and Inspiration

Rupashi Dingal, a homemaker and marginal farmer from Dhablat village, struggled to support her family with a small plot and pond. Despite her efforts, household expenses mounted, especially with her two children in school. Seeing her potential, Sabuj Sangha's HRDP Parivartan team selected her for their Pond-Based Integrated Farming program. With financial aid and training, Rupashi embraced organic farming and vermicomposting. She grew crops like bitter gourd, tomatoes, and set up poultry on her pond's embankment. Within a year, she earned over Rs. 1,14,826 from her farm, named "Dingal Farm." Recognized as a resource farmer, Rupashi now plans to expand her venture, inspiring others to adopt sustainable farming practices. Her journey from struggle to success highlights the transformative power of determination and support.

Sundarban German Bakery is a community-driven enterprise established in 2015 in Nandakumarpur, West Bengal, that plays a pivotal role in empowering women and fostering local economic development. The bakery provides employment and skills training to 45 individuals, including both men and women, creating a sustainable source of income for the community. It produces a wide variety of

high-quality bakery products using premium ingredients, which are distributed locally and in Kolkata. The bakery generates a total monthly income of Rs. 48,000, significantly impacting the local economy by supporting its employees and local vendors. Women involved in vending can earn approximately Rs. 7,000 per month, enhancing their financial independence and family well-being. The bakery's dedication to women's empowerment is evident through its training programs, which equip women with the skills needed to become successful bakers and entrepreneurs, contributing to the community's overall socioeconomic upliftment.

Rapid urbanization in Kolkata has made urban slums more susceptible to poor hygiene, waterborne diseases, and inadequate access to safe drinking water, increasing residents' exposure to communicable and non-communicable diseases. To address these challenges, Sabuj Sangha, in collaboration with Wipro Cares and Wipro Foundation, launched the 'Niramoy' project in 2019 to provide enhanced healthcare services to the urban poor. The project operates in wards no. 28, 35, 36 of Bidhannagar Municipal Corporation; wards no. 58, 79, 80, 108 of Kolkata Municipal Corporation; and ward no. 10 of Rajpur Sonarpur Municipality.

WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

Sabuj Sangha serves as a key catalyst in driving various initiatives that focus on ensuring access to safe drinking water, sanitation facilities, and hygiene education for communities, particularly in the remote villages of the Sundarbans in South 24 Parganas district and in the villages of Nadia district.

A core element of these programs is fostering community ownership to promote long-term sustainability and effective maintenance of assets such as handpumps and tubewells. To this end, Sabuj Sangha has provided mentorship to user committees formed from the community, guiding them in setting up bank accounts and generating funds dedicated to the upkeep and repair of these communal assets. A crucial aspect of this initiative is the emphasis on hygiene education, which raises awareness around handwashing practices, safe drinking water, and menstrual hygiene to promote healthier communities. Additionally, this past year, one of the initiatives encouraged waste management practices in the community in Nadia district by making a provision for a waste collection vehicle.

ENVIRONMENT & **DISASTER RESPONSE**

In the post-pandemic world, natural disasters, emergencies, and environmental degradation have continued to be pressing global concerns. The Sundarbans, in particular, face ongoing threats from ecological imbalances and climatic risks. This fragile region, known for its unique geography, urgently requires heightened community awareness and consciousness-raising efforts, alongside proactive climate change interventions, to mitigate the risks it faces.

Over the past year, our programs have specifically focused on addressing these environmental challenges. By raising awareness and fostering a deeper understanding of the environmental threats within the Sundarbans, we have worked to empower the broader community to take action and engage in sustainable practices aimed at preserving the region's delicate ecosystem.

Natural Resource Management

Location: South 24 Parganas and Nadia districts of West Bengal Supported by: HDFC Bank Ltd., Wipro Foundation, SBI Foundation

In continuation from last year, Sabuj Sangha under the purview of HDFC Bank Ltd. Parivartan Project continued to promote range of initiatives among the wider communities of Sagar Island coastal villages that includes rainwater harvesting, mangrove plantation, support for organic farming and vermi compost productions.

To promote sustainable energy practices and improve the learning environment, a successful installation of solar panels was completed at a government school in Nadia district. This initiative addresses the issue of frequent power outages, which have long disrupted educational activities, while also serving as a model for the development of eco-friendly infrastructure in the region. By utilizing solar energy, the school now benefits from a reliable and renewable power source, ensuring that classrooms remain adequately lit and ventilated, and that essential educational resources such as computers and fans can be used without interruption. This project underscores a strong commitment to advancing green energy solutions in educational institutions, delivering substantial benefits for both students and the environment.

In recent years, Sabuj Sangha has been unwavering in its commitment to the rejuvenation of mangrove vegetation in the Sundarbans. The mangrove plantation drives continued throughout FY 2023-24, carried out in close partnership with local communities and Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs).

To ensure the sustainability of these conservation efforts, Mangrove Protection Groups (MPGs) were established, along with the development of Mangrove Sensitive Communities (MSCs). These groups



play a vital role in safeguarding the mangrove ecosystem. In addition, members of the MPGs were provided with support to explore alternative livelihoods based on natural resources, such as poultry farming and pond-based integrated farming, further promoting both environmental conservation and economic resilience within the community.






