## YEARS IN PERSPECTIVE

### Our Origin Story

The Sundarban delta, with its fragile beauty, is a place of hardship, battered by cyclones, severed from the mainland and basic amenities, and facing deep systemic and infrastructural gaps in health, education, and livelihood opportunities. In the quiet village of Nandakumarpur, nestled deep in the Sundarbans, life has always been shaped by the rhythm of the tides and the trials of nature. Here, in 1954, a small group of spirited young people came together to form a social club, a place to share ideas, energy, and hope for their community. They had little in terms of resources, but they had plenty of determination. They began by organising activities, lending a hand in times of need, and giving their community reasons to believe that change was possible.

In 1975, their informal club took a decisive step, becoming **Sabuj Sangha**, officially registered under the West Bengal Societies Registration Act. From those humble beginnings, the organisation's vision grew clear to work hand-in-hand with communities, not just to address urgent needs, but to create lasting change.

Over the decades, we expanded our reach from relief and rehabilitation work during floods and cyclones to holistic, community-led, and -owned development. Today, we address the interlinked challenges and needs of the communities we work with, from ill health to illiteracy, from lack of livelihoods to environmental degradation. Guided by the belief that real progress comes from empowering people to shape their futures, Sabuj Sangha's journey from a small village club to a multi-thematic development organisation stands as a testament to what collective will can achieve.






**Mr. Palan Chandra Paik (59)**






## Building resilient villages through integrated, community-led development

The Holistic Rural Development Project (HRDP) – Parivartan is Sabuj Sangha's flagship initiative in Sagar Island, implemented in partnership with HDFC Bank Ltd. The programme aims to transform 15 villages into resilient, self-reliant communities through an integrated approach that addresses livelihood security, women's empowerment, education, health, natural resource management, and disaster resilience. By focusing on climate-sensitive agriculture, strengthening of community institutions, and improving access to services, HRDP seeks to build long-term resilience in one of the most vulnerable regions of the Sundarbans.

The programme has enabled modernisation of the Agriculture Resource Centre with digital facilities and power backup, benefitting farmers' training. Women SHGs are proactively taking leadership in mangrove protection and poultry farming. Farmers are adopting organic farming and vermicompost sales as an additional income source. Schools have been transformed into safe, child-friendly spaces encouraging joyful learning. Farmer Producer Company (FPC) and Agriculture Resource Centre (ARC) have evolved as community-owned institutions driving sustainable change.

Maintained and protected **7,000 mangroves** planted in previous years; women SHG members now oversee their conservation

**16 group-based poultry enterprises** established involving 65 rural women across 8 villages.

The **Gram Seva Programme** is an integrated rural development initiative supported by SBI Foundation and implemented by Sabuj Sangha in five villages of Shimurali Gram Panchayat, Nadia. It addresses multiple interlinked areas including digitalisation, quality education, primary health, safe drinking water and sanitation, sustainable livelihoods, women's empowerment, youth engagement, environment protection, and community infrastructure. The programme seeks to empower rural families and build resilient, self-reliant villages, by combining service delivery with awareness-building and participatory capacity development. Communities are increasingly valuing education, adopting hygiene practices, opening bank accounts, using digital financial tools, and there is a noted shift in entrepreneurial mindset towards organic farming and collective livelihoods.

**The Nayantara Programme** addresses deep-rooted social and gender norms towards child and early marriage, early pregnancy, by empowering adolescent girls to build agency and control their futures. It provides a safe platform for girls to build confidence, pursue education, develop life skills, and speak out against harmful societal practices. Nayantara nurtures leadership among girls through Kishori Bahini groups, life skills training, extracurricular activities, cultural programmes, and mentorship by Nayantara Mitras, creating a generation of young women who are determined to delay marriage, continue education, and pursue financial independence.

**284 parents** participated in **17 parents' meetings**.

**450 people** reached through **19 cultural programmes**.

**26 girls** passed secondary and higher secondary examinations.



## A Timely Intervention: How the Nayantara Kishori Bahini stopped a Child Marriage

In September 2024, a member of the Nayantara Kishori Bahini received a distressing report indicating that a child marriage was scheduled to take place that very evening in a nearby village. Responding promptly, she alerted her supervisor, who immediately mobilized the team to verify the information. By late afternoon, the team confirmed that the wedding was planned to occur during the auspicious sunset hour, locally referred to as mvgodhuli lagna..

Understanding the urgency, the team of young Kishoris, supported by Nayantara Mitras and staff, decided to intervene directly. When they reached the boy's home, they faced denial, evasion, and even intimidation from the family. Still, the girls stood firm, counselling them about the legal and emotional consequences of child marriage. When tensions escalated, they called Childline and the local police, ensuring official support. By nightfall, the police had detained the boy's family members, registered a case, and rescued the girl, placing her in a safe shelter. The marriage was stopped just in time.

Across India, child marriage continues to rob thousands of girls of their childhoods, education, and futures. Despite legal prohibitions, economic hardship, patriarchal norms, and social pressures often drive families to marry off their daughters early. This highlights the importance of community vigilance and youth leadership in preventing such violations.

The Nayantara Kishori Bahini, a collective of adolescent girls trained to challenge gender-based discrimination, demonstrated remarkable courage and coordination that day. Their timely action protected a girl from lifelong harm and strengthened collaboration between the community, Childline, and law enforcement.

This story is not just about one prevented marriage; it is a testament to what informed, empowered girls can achieve when they take a stand against injustice. Their voices are rewriting the narrative of what girlhood can mean in rural India: one of agency, solidarity, and hope.

## CASE STUDY

Established in 2000, for more than two decades the **Kishalaya Shishu Shiksha Niketan** is Sabuj Sangha's model school in the heart of the Sundarbans, designed to bring quality, holistic education to first-generation learners. In a region marked by poverty, climate vulnerability, and migration, the school nurtures children with joyful learning methods, digital education tools, life skills training, and co-curricular opportunities. It has become a trusted hub for parents and children alike, offering not just academics, but also nutrition through mid-day meals, free books, etc. ensuring all-round growth of disadvantaged children. Parents have increasingly appreciated the school's unique approach in combining structured academics with play-based learning and cultural enrichment. The school has set a new standard in education in the remote Sundarbans, offering a vibrant alternative to traditional government and private schools. Children are not only performing well academically but are also gaining confidence, discipline, and cultural exposure.

### Updates of 2024-25

**Total reach: 206 students (117 boys, 89 girls)** enrolled in **preschool** and **primary sections**

Interactive smart panels installed to integrate digital methods into classroom teaching

Multiple trainings on pedagogy, life skills, and play-way methods conducted with teachers to strengthen capacities.

Children in the tea garden communities of Alipurduar face multiple vulnerabilities, such as school dropouts, early marriages, child labour, malnutrition, and lack of protection services. The **Nabadiganta** programme seeks to break these cycles by providing children with access to non-formal education centres, nutritional and health support, life skills, and protection from child labour and marriage. It also works closely with parents, community leaders, and local institutions to build awareness and strengthen safety nets for children. Currently, Nabadiganta runs two non-formal education (NFE) centres in remote tea-garden communities.

## Natun Alo – Residential Rehabilitation Programme for Prevention of Child Labour

'**Natun Alo**' is a residential school run by Sabuj Sangha to rehabilitate and prevent children from entering exploitative child labour. Located in Nandakumarpur, one of the most vulnerable parts of the Sundarbans, the programme provides marginalized boys with a safe residential environment, regular schooling, life skills, and holistic care. It addresses the dual challenges of poverty and social neglect by ensuring education, health, nutrition, and personal development, enabling children to break the cycle of labour and deprivation.

## Updates of 2024-25

**Total reach: Boys: 22**

Students advanced across grades III–XI; two boys appeared for the Madhyamik examination.

Regular health check-ups were conducted through Sabuj Sangha's Swarnalata Sabuj Seva Sadan Rural Hospital; each child maintains an individual health card.

Daily nutritional support was ensured with balanced meals covering breakfast, lunch, evening snacks, and dinner.

Life skills, art and craft, yoga, prayer, sports, and extracurricular activities enriched holistic learning.

Special mentoring in English was provided to improve communication and future readiness.

Students actively participated in cultural and social events including Rabindra Jayanti, Independence Day, Saraswati Puja, World Environment Day, and the Annual Sports Meet.

This large-scale initiative addressed critical gaps in education and health infrastructure. In 2024–25, **83 schools, 28 ICDS centres**, and 23 health centres were upgraded with repairs, BaLA artwork, safe drinking water, sanitation, girls' common rooms, and digital learning facilities. These improvements significantly enhanced student retention, early childhood care, and access to public healthcare, fostering inclusive and child-friendly community institutions.

## Computer Literacy Programme

In partnership with IBM Kolkata, Sabuj Sangha co-hosted the 18th annual Computer Literacy Programme, benefitting children from Sundarbans and Kolkata slums. Over 171 IBM personnel volunteered, teaching basics to advanced computer skills, internet use, data security, and AI. The children confidently showcased their learnings through group presentations on current topics, fostering digital literacy and self-expression.

Sabuj Sangha also implemented smaller remedial and digital education efforts, extending after-school learning, activity-based pedagogy, and access to technology for marginalized children. These short-term interventions complemented larger education programmes, bridging gaps for first-generation learners and supporting retention in formal schools.

## Partners' Collaboration Grant Project

The Partners' Collaboration Grant Project, supported by the Global Fund for Children (GFC), created a unique platform for cross-country collaboration and learning among Sabuj Sangha (India), CDP (Bangladesh), and Atoot (Nepal). The initiative aimed to build capacities, exchange best practices, and pilot innovative approaches such as Sports for Development and Girls for Social Action.

### Updates of 2024-25

Exposure visits, joint trainings, and participatory monitoring sessions using the Most Significant Change (MSC) technique facilitated rich knowledge exchange.

Partners drew from each other's experiences in livelihood models, youth engagement, and safeguarding practices.

The collaboration enhanced organisational skills in project formulation, donor engagement, and participatory evaluation.

Sports-based activities and girl-led initiatives were introduced, empowering adolescent girls as leaders and changemakers.

While developing a common module across diverse contexts proved difficult, the learning process strengthened adaptability and cross-cultural understanding.

## Saving Childhoods: Bilash Naiya rises from Adversity

In the fragile coastal belt of South 24 Parganas, where poverty and climate risks often push children into labour or early marriage, **18-year-old Bilash Naiya** from Kuemuri village stands as a story of hope. Born into a humble farming family, Bilash's life changed when his father died of cancer. The emotional loss and debt from medical expenses forced him to leave school and help his mother in the fields while his elder brother migrated for work.

Bilash's story mirrors that of many children in the Sundarbans who, left without parental support, are vulnerable to child labour, trafficking, and exploitation. To address this reality, Sabuj Sangha established 'Natun Alo', a residential facility for underprivileged children rescued from unsafe conditions. Identified by the local Village Pradhan in 2018, Bilash was enrolled in the programme.

At first shy and withdrawn, Bilash gradually found stability and encouragement at Natun Alo. With the support of caring teachers and mentors, he rebuilt his confidence and excelled academically—scoring 92.8% in Class 12 and later enrolling in Ashutosh College, University of Calcutta, where he is now pursuing a B.A. (Hons) in Geography.

Despite financial pressures, Bilash continues his education while seeking part-time work to support his family. His dream is to work in social development, helping other children like him reclaim their right to education and a safe, dignified childhood.



# CASE STUDY

## HEALTH AND NUTRITION

### Bringing health within everyone's reach

For families in remote villages of Sundarbans, tea gardens in North Bengal, and urban settlements in Kolkata, access to quality healthcare often remains out of reach, either due to distance, lack of facilities, or poverty. Sabuj Sangha has long recognised that without accessible, affordable, and preventive healthcare, cycles of illness and poverty persist. From the very beginning, Sabuj Sangha has placed safe motherhood and maternal and child health at the core of its health work, recognising that the well-being of mothers is the foundation of healthy families and thriving communities. Through its integrated health programmes, the organisation has worked to ensure that care reaches people where they live. From restoring vision and preventing blindness through eye care to strengthening maternal, child, and adolescent health and delivering medical services at the doorstep through mobile medical units, Sabuj Sangha bridges the healthcare access gap through strategic steps. Together, these initiatives combine curative services with awareness, nutrition support, and preventive practices, building healthier communities, one family at a time.



# SBI Foundation Eye Care Programme

Eye health is one of the most pressing concerns among elderly and vulnerable populations in the Sundarbans, where access to specialised care is limited. With the nearest eye hospital located over 60 km away, Sabuj Sangha's **Swarnalata Sabuj Seva Sadan – Rural Health and Training Centre (SSSS - RHTC)** serves as a vital lifeline for communities in South 24 Parganas. Supported by the **SBI Foundation**, the **Eye Care Programme** situated within the SSSS aims to identify patients with cataract and other eye conditions, provide timely surgical intervention, deliver outpatient and outreach services, and raise awareness on preventive eye care. The programme combines regular eye screening camps, surgeries, and counselling to ensure that the most marginalised have access to sight-restoring care.

## Mobile Medical Units

The **Mobile Medical Unit (MMU)** initiative ensures that people living in some of the most remote and underserved parts of North Bengal have access to essential healthcare services. Implemented by Sabuj Sangha with support from the National Health Mission, the programme brings quality medical care directly to people's doorsteps, reducing barriers of distance, cost, and mobility. Each unit is staffed with professional doctors and technicians and equipped with facilities for clinical consultations, laboratory tests, X-rays, ECGs, and free medicines. The MMU has improved early detection and treatment of illnesses, and significantly reduced out-of-pocket expenses and dependence on unqualified local practitioners.

The **Niramoy Programme** provides doorstep preventive, promotive, and curative health services to underserved families in urban slums of Kolkata, Rajpur Sonarpur, and Bidhannagar. Through community clinics staffed with medical experts, the programme ensures safe motherhood, **safe childhood, improved adolescent health, and better nutrition outcomes**. With a focus on maternal and child health, malnutrition management, adolescent anaemia, and life-skills development, Niramoy builds health awareness while linking families with public systems. The clinics offer OPD, ANC/PNC care, nutrition monitoring, counselling, lab tests, and referrals, ensuring that even the most vulnerable have access to free, reliable healthcare.

### Updates of 2024-25

**Total reach: 6500 + | Adults: 6000+ | Children & adolescents: 557**

**5,397 patients** accessed OPD and curative services.

**34 pregnant women and 13 lactating mothers** identified as malnourished; provided with supplements, counselling, and regular monitoring.

**103 children** under 5 years of age screened for malnutrition; linked to ICDS centres for nutritional support; families counselled on immunisation.

**46 malnourished adolescent girls** identified; provided with counselling, haemoglobin and Mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) testing, supplements, and awareness on healthy diet and menstrual hygiene.

**408 adolescent girls** reached through **43 monthly meetings** on engaging topics such as life skills, information on sexual and reproductive health, and nutrition awareness.

**539 people** reached through **49 community meetings** on awareness regarding family planning, ANC/PNC care, menstrual hygiene, and nutrition.

**61 local stakeholders** were reached through 8 meetings with Urban Local Body members engaged 61 stakeholders to strengthen ownership and support.

# Sanjeevani - Clinic on Wheels

The remote tea garden and forest communities of Alipurduar face critical barriers in accessing healthcare due to poor transport, limited government facilities, and widespread poverty. Many families rely on untrained practitioners, resulting in untreated illnesses and preventable deaths. To bridge this gap, Sabuj Sangha, with support from the SBI Foundation, launched the **Sanjeevani – Clinic on Wheels** initiative. This mobile medical unit travels to hard-to-reach areas, delivering **outpatient consultations, laboratory tests, specialised health camps, and health awareness sessions**. The clinic provides essential curative and preventive services right at the community's doorstep, reducing dependence on quacks and strengthening local health-seeking behaviour. Communities that once relied on unregistered medical practitioners are increasingly accessing reliable healthcare. Preventive practices are being adopted, awareness of non-communicable diseases is growing, and families now have local, affordable alternatives to distant hospitals.

## Updates of 2024-25

**Total reach: 20,074 people**

**10,778 people** reached through **632 camps**

**590 people** reached through **7 specialised camps** providing antenatal care services, non-communicable disease, gynaecological, eye care, and hypertension camps.

**3,695** out of them accessed laboratory services such as haemoglobin, uric acid, diabetes, and blood pressure checkups.

**6,615 people** reached through **256 awareness camps** covering topics such as hypertension prevention, personal hygiene, diabetes care, antenatal health, breastfeeding, and malaria/dengue prevention.

**2091 participants** reached through **13 campaigns** of Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan in schools and communities, with youth and students engaged in cleanliness drives and hygiene awareness.



## Bilasi Das' Journey to Regaining Her Eyesight

In the quiet village of Jaganathchak, **80-year-old widow Bilasi Das** had long been struggling with failing eyesight. After losing her husband three decades ago, Bilasi depended on her youngest son, a daily wage labourer, to support their family of five. Though she had earlier undergone surgery on her left eye, her vision remained blurred, making everyday life increasingly difficult.

Determined to find relief, Bilasi sought help when a health worker from Sabuj Sangha informed her about an upcoming eye camp in Madhusudanchak village. There, doctors examined her and diagnosed a cataract in her right eye that required immediate surgery. Hopeful yet anxious, Bilasi agreed to the procedure, trusting the team that promised to restore her sight.

On January 21, 2025, Bilasi underwent cataract surgery at Sabuj Sangha Hospital. The operation was a success. For the first time in years, she could see clearly again - the faces of her grandchildren, the path to her courtyard, and the vibrant world around her. The joy of regained sight filled her home with new energy and optimism. Today, Bilasi moves about her village with confidence and independence. Her restored vision has not only transformed her daily life but also rekindled her spirit. She remains deeply grateful to the doctors, nurses, and community health workers who made this possible.

Bilasi's story reflects the profound impact of accessible eye care in rural communities. For her, the gift of sight is more than medical recovery - it is a return to dignity, self-reliance, and hope. Through the compassionate work of organizations like Sabuj Sangha, countless others like Bilasi can once again witness the world in all its colour and light.

## WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

### Building climate resilience through water

Access to clean water and sanitation is not just a basic need—it is a lifeline for health, dignity, and resilience. In the climate-vulnerable Sundarbans, where salinity, flooding, and water scarcity pose daily challenges, Sabuj Sangha's WASH interventions focus on sustainable, community-driven solutions. From creating systems for safe drinking water and hygiene to building climate-resilient infrastructure, the organisation empowers families to manage resources sustainably. These efforts, grounded in local participation, ensure that every household can live with dignity, health, and hope even in the face of environmental adversity.

**The Kanailal Raha Jol Prokolpa** addresses the acute freshwater scarcity of Dhananjay Colony, a coastal hamlet of the Sundarbans prone to salinity intrusion and recurring cyclones. Sabuj Sangha developed a large community pond (53,625 sq. ft.) for rainwater harvesting, combining it with embankment strengthening, desilting, and integrated livelihood practices. The initiative not only secured safe water but also improved nutrition and incomes through plantation, vegetable cultivation, and fish rearing.

The project has strengthened climate resilience in one of the most vulnerable parts of the Sundarbans, turning a single pond into a hub of water security, food security, and community solidarity.

## Updates of 2024-25

A **solar-powered bathing ghat** and community facility was built to ensure safe, sustainable water use.

Over **40** families directly benefitted from improved access to water, nutrition, and income opportunities.

A **Pond Protection Committee** – Dhananjay Kanailal Jol Prokolpo Committee – was formed, ensuring sustainability and community ownership.





# LIVELIHOODS AND WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

## Building economic resilience, empowering communities

For decades, Sabuj Sangha has recognized that economic independence is at the heart of empowerment. In some of the most climate-vulnerable and economically deprived regions of West Bengal, the organisation has invested in strengthening women and families through skill-building, enterprise development, financial literacy, and access to markets. From goat-rearing and tailoring schools to women-led cooperatives and digital entrepreneurship, these initiatives are not just enhancing incomes, they are building confidence, dignity, and resilience. The programmes showcased here reflect how sustainable livelihoods and women's leadership can transform households and communities.



# Digital Sakhi

The Digital Sakhi programme has built a cadre of 100 trained Digital Sakhis (DSs) who drive digital and financial literacy across rural Murshidabad. By combining door-to-door education with digital camps, the programme strengthens women's economic participation and financial inclusion. In parallel, the project identified and trained 585 Women Entrepreneurs (WEs) in agri-allied and small trades, helping them access markets and resources for sustainable livelihoods.

The project has demonstrated that women-led digital literacy can overcome deep socio-political, cultural, and operational barriers, fostering confidence, enterprise, and financial independence in rural communities.

## Updates of 2024-25

**100 Digital Sakhis** active, despite attrition challenges, delivering consistent digital-financial education.

**628** onboarded as women entrepreneurs; **585** completed structured training in business, finance, and enterprise management.

**67** Joint Liability Groups (JLGs) formed and trained, fostering collective women-led enterprises.

**3,071** beneficiaries accessed government schemes, generating a convergence value of **₹39.7** crore.

**4,393** community members (3,202 women; 1,191 men) adopted digital and financial practices.

At the District-Level Stakeholders' Workshop (Feb 2025), the PD DRDC & Additional Mission Director praised the initiative for addressing digital and financial exclusion in Murshidabad, highlighting cyber fraud prevention as a particularly valuable component.



# From Struggle to Success: Monopriya's Journey as a Woman Entrepreneur

Born into a humble farming family, 35-year-old Monopriya Mandal grew up surrounded by the realities of poverty. Her husband, a daily wage labourer, worked hard to provide for their family, while Monopriya cared for their two daughters. To support the household, she used her basic sewing skills to earn a modest income. But with earnings of barely ₹500-₹1000 a month, life remained a constant struggle.

A turning point came when Monopriya was introduced to a Digital Sakhi in her neighbourhood. Through her, Monopriya learned about the eight pillars of empowerment and was encouraged to consider entrepreneurship. At first hesitant, she eventually enrolled in a five-day business training programme that transformed her outlook. The sessions helped her understand concepts such as market surveys, demand and supply, and business planning, giving her the confidence to dream bigger.

Armed with new knowledge, Monopriya sharpened her tailoring skills and also learned jewellery-making. She began supplying garments to local shops and worked with women's self-help groups to secure bulk orders. Soon, she expanded into stitching children's clothes and toys from home. Careful to track her profits and losses, she gradually scaled her enterprise. What once brought in less than ₹1,000 a month now generates ₹5,000-₹6,000 in steady income.

Her achievements have not gone unnoticed. Monopriya participated in Business Plan Competitions, reaching the district level, and was even invited by the Block Office to become a sewing trainer, an offer she had to decline to focus on her growing business.

Today, Monopriya is proud to be financially independent and able to raise her daughters with dignity. Her story reflects the transformative impact of women's entrepreneurship, supported by initiatives like the Digital Sakhi programme of Sabuj Sangha and L&T Finance.

*"I am deeply grateful to the Digital Sakhi initiative, Sabuj Sangha, and L&T Finance for empowering me to achieve my dreams and transform my life,"* says Monopriya, her voice filled with pride and determination.

Monopriya's journey stands as a powerful testament to resilience, hard work, and the right support, showing how women from the most modest beginnings can rewrite their futures.



# CASE STUDY

## Sundarban German Bakery

The **Sundarban German Bakery**, established in 2015, is a pioneering **women-owned and women-managed cooperative enterprise**. It aims to provide sustainable employment to rural women, enhance their financial independence, and supply good quality, nutritious food products to local communities. By breaking gender stereotypes in a male-dominated trade, the bakery has become a symbol of women's empowerment in the Sundarbans.

### Updates of 2024-25

**16** regular and contractual staff employed (majority women), supported by **35** local vendors who sell products in the community.

Regular and contractual staff on average earn **₹2000-7000** per month; vendors earn between **₹2,500-₹10,000** monthly.

Daily production of **3** types of bread, **2** types of cake, and **37** types of biscuits, using **~300** kg flour/day.

Staff trained in production, packaging, quality monitoring, hygiene, and marketing.

The bakery became financially independent in **2024-25**, with computerized systems for accounts and inventory.

Expert guidance from Mr. Allard Jacobs (PUM, Netherlands) led to the introduction of new bakery items, improved hygiene, and low-cost infrastructure solutions.

## Tailoring School

To address unemployment among educated youth, especially women from marginalized communities, Sabuj Sangha established a **Tailoring School in Contai** with support from IndienHilfe e.V., Germany. Over the past two years, the initiative has enabled women to learn tailoring skills, produce and market garments and stuffed toys, and gain financial independence.

### Updates of 2024-25

The school has successfully provided training and livelihood opportunities to **20** women.

Out of **20** women who received training, **10** are now working independently and earning up to **₹8,000** per month, which supports their families and strengthens their financial stability.

Participants are producing garments, bags, and stuffed toys, which are marketed locally, creating income and recognition for their craft.

Women have gained entrepreneurial skills, including product design, quality control, and small-scale marketing.

The project has enhanced confidence and decision-making power among women, strengthening their role within families and communities.

# Heidi Goats in Coastal West Bengal

The **Heidi Goats Project** is designed to improve livelihoods and nutrition in some of the most climate-vulnerable villages of coastal West Bengal. By distributing **800 Black Bengal goats** to **400 marginalized families**, and combining this with training in scientific rearing, marketing, and financial literacy, the project has provided families with a sustainable income stream and improved food security. Women, in particular, have emerged as key caretakers and decision-makers in goat management, strengthening their role in family income and community resilience.

## Updates of 2024-25

**400** families across **16** villages benefitted directly through goat-rearing.

**800** Black Bengal goats provided as starter assets for income generation.

Families received regular training in goat management, feed and healthcare practices, and financial literacy.

Improved household access to milk and meat, contributing to dietary diversity.

Families connected to local markets for sustainable income through goat sales.





# ENVIRONMENT AND DISASTER RESPONSE

## Restoring nature, protecting ecosystems

At the heart of the Sundarbans, where lives are deeply intertwined with fragile ecosystems, Sabuj Sangha has long recognised that environmental sustainability and community resilience go hand in hand. From mangrove restoration and social forestry to renewable energy and disaster relief, the organisation's initiatives reflect a holistic approach to climate action. These programmes not only safeguard the natural environment but also equip vulnerable families with the means to adapt, recover, and thrive amidst recurring climate shocks. Through partnerships and active community participation, Sabuj Sangha continues to stand as a pillar of resilience, rebuilding both landscapes and lives.



# Sundari Resilience Project – Phase II

The **Sundari Resilience Project – Phase II** builds on earlier efforts to restore the fragile ecosystems of Sagar Island in the Sundarbans. Implemented with the support of IndienHilfe and Bingo Foundation, the project combined **mangrove reforestation** with **community-based livelihood support** to strengthen ecological and economic resilience.

## Updates of 2024-25

**River shore plantations** were undertaken despite the challenges of tidal waves and soil erosion.

**Local communities, particularly women, are actively involved** in plantation, awareness campaigns, and protection activities.

**100 vulnerable families supported** with poultry, goat-rearing, and pond-based farming as climate-resilient income alternatives.

Households gained both **environmental awareness and sustainable income** sources, reducing their dependence on fragile natural resources.

## Social Forestry & Rejuvenation of Mangroves

Launched in **March 2025**, this initiative combined **mangrove restoration** with **social forestry for SC/ST communities** in three vulnerable Sundarbans blocks. The project has not only rejuvenated ecosystems but also supported **livelihoods, nutrition, and climate resilience** through community stewardship.

## Updates of 2024-25

**4,500 mangroves planted** over 0.75 hectares in Sagar block.

**1,150 multipurpose saplings** distributed to **230 families** in Mathurapur II and Patharpratima.

**Community Engagement:** Mangrove Protection Committees formed to ensure sustainability.

# 40 kWp On-grid Solar Plant at Nandakumarpur

# SBI Remal Cyclone Relief Response

In the aftermath of **Cyclone Remal (2024)**, Sabuj Sangha, with support from the SBI Foundation, launched an immediate and large-scale relief operation to assist vulnerable families across the Sundarbans. The initiative focused on shelter repair, essential relief distribution, healthcare, and community awareness, reaching some of the most severely affected regions.

## Updates of 2024-25

**1,000** cyclone-affected families received tarpaulin and rope for urgent house repairs.

**1,000** hygiene kits, including soap, sanitizers, menstrual hygiene products, etc., were distributed.

**2,305** people were treated through 28 medical camps for injuries, infections, and waterborne diseases.

**359** people reached through **6 awareness sessions** conducted on hygiene, preventive health, and disaster preparedness.

# ARANYA – Restoring Mangroves, Reviving Resilience

Launched in **January 2025**, **Project ARANYA** is a three-year initiative to rejuvenate the **mangrove ecosystems of the Sundarbans**, one of the world's most climate-vulnerable regions. By restoring degraded mangrove forests and promoting sustainable ecosystem management, the project seeks to mitigate climate change, strengthen carbon sequestration, and improve the resilience of coastal communities. With a plan to plant **7,15,000 mangroves across 95 hectares**, ARANYA aims to be both an environmental and a community-driven solution.

Even in its inception phase, the project has generated **community awareness and ownership** around mangrove restoration, ensuring that local people, especially women and SHGs, will play an active role in conservation.

## Updates of 2024-25

**13 capacity-building meetings** held across villages and Gram Panchayats, sensitising communities to the role of mangroves in climate resilience.



**Char lands identified for plantation**; baseline survey, species selection, and mangrove plantation at scale are planned for April 2025.








Annual Turnover in Figure(Hundred)




